COURSE DESCRIPTION: Intentional wrongs to person and property; negligence; duty of persons in control of property; tort liability arising from contractual relationshys; liability for defective products; liability without fault; deceit; defamation; malicious prosecution; interference with economic and other legally protectable relations, tort alternatives. COURSE OBJECTIVES / ANTICIPATED LEARNING OUTCOMES: This course will cover intentional wrongs to person and property; negligence; duty of persons in control of property; liability without fault; products liability, missnec; defamation; privacy; misuse of legal process; misrepresentation; interference with contractual relations; and unclassified torts.
