Students must demonstrate that they possess a minimum level of knowledge and understanding to successfully obtain a passing grade on California Bar Examination questions involving what the Committee of Bar Examiners has designated as the "Remedies" subject areas. Students should expect to spend a minimum of two hours/per hour of instruction time on assigned readings and briefing cases. For example, a 3-hour class would require at least 6 hours of outside preparation time per week. FORMAT OVERVIEW / METHOD The course materials contained in the assigned case books will be **OF INSTRUCTION** (Description of presented in a lecture discussion and Socratic dialogue method format. how the course will be taught, including Students are to brief in advance of class all of the assigned breakdown of lecture, practicum, etc.) cases from the casebook, **including** those featured in the text "Notes" between the case extracts. Students are expected to be fully prepared on each case or other text materials included in the assignments, for each class. The 2-hour mid-term exam will cover Syllabus subjects described in **EXAMS:** the WEEK 1 through WEEK 14 assignments. A **3-hour** cumulative final exam will cover all course assignments from both semesters. Students will be expected to identify all the issues that are raised by the question, and demonstrate an understanding of the applicable law by applying that law to the specific facts of the question. It will not be sufficient merely to identify issues, or to generally discuss abstract legal principles or doctrines. Exams begin promptly at 6 p.m. Students must take the examination as scheduled. In an emergency or a special circumstance, a delayed exam may be necessary. "Emergency" is defined as a serious illness or injury to the student or a member of his or her immediate family. Special Circumstances are defined as other situations that, in the opinion of the Dean, are sufficient to warrant delay in taking examinations. Any student taking a delayed examination must have the prior written approval of the Dean. No examination may be taken *prior* to the day of the regularly scheduled examination. If delayed examinations are approved by the Dean, a fee of \$75 will be charged for each such exam. 	The final course grade will be determined by (i) an essay format mid-term exam (weighed at 40% of the total) (ii) an essay format final exam (weighed at 50% of the total), and (iii) up to 10% in points for the quality of class participation at the sole discretion of
	the instructor may be used to enhance a student's overall score. The 2-hour mid-term exam will cover Syllabus subjects described in the WEEK 1 through WEEK 14 assignments. The 3-hour final exam will
	cover all course assignments from both semesters.
ATTENDANCE:	Regular and punctual attendance is essential for the successful completion of the course. Students should plan to attend every class. Students must attend a minimum of 80% (12 of 15 classes in Fall and in Spring) of the class sessions during each semester.
	General policy information: Roll will be taken at each class. Class attendance in person is of particular importance in learning the language and concepts of the law. Make-up classes will be scheduled on evenings when classes are not usually held, or on weekends, or made up at another regularly-scheduled night session, by staying longer. Class sessions which are delayed or canceled because of holidays or policy of Empire College School of Law, and which are re-scheduled for a different date, are considered regularly scheduled class sessions, not "make-up" classes. A student who has exceeded the absence limits specified in this Syllabus will be automatically dropped from the course. A student who is dropped will be required to repeat the course at its next offering, in order to meet graduation requirements.
