| COURSE DESCRIPTION: | Jurisdictional issues; classification of marital property, community or separate; valuation of community property including business and goodwill; management of marital property; liability for marital and individual debts; division of community property on dissolution or death; problems posed by unmarried, cohabiting couples. |
| COURSE OBJECTIVES / ANTICIPATED LEARNING OUTCOMES: (Description of what students will be expected to know and be able to do at the end of the course. What skills or knowledge will be gained by the end of the course.) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> To give the student a working knowledge of California Community Property Law, including but not limited to the following: identification and characterization of marital property and debts; valuation of community property assets; division of marital assets and debts upon dissolution of marriage; management and control of community property; special issues concerning non-marital cohabitation, real estate, business assets, deferred compensation, and tax consequences of community property division. Students must demonstrate they possess a minimum level of knowledge to pass a CA State Bar Examination question involving the subject matter of Community Property. Assist student in developing skills required to pass the CA Bar Examination; receive instruction on Bar exam questions and grading procedures, and enhancing the student's writing and analytical skills. |

| <p>EXAMS:</p> | <p>Exams begin promptly at 6:00 p.m. Take-home exams and papers must be submitted to the Law School office by 6:00 p.m. on the due date, unless otherwise noted. All students must take examinations as scheduled. It is recognized. That in special circumstances and due to emergencies, it may be necessary to schedule delayed examinations. An emergency is defined as a serious illness or injury to the student or a member of his or her immediate family. Special circumstances are defined as other situations that, in the opinion of the Dean, are sufficient to warrant delay in taking examinations. Any student taking delayed examinations <u>must have the prior written approval of the Dean.</u> No examination may be taken <u>prior</u> to the day of the regularly scheduled examination.
